A Tribute to Thelma Heatwole

This month, the Glendale Arizona Historical Society will celebrate the career of Glendale's famous journalist and author, Thelma Heatwole.

Carol St. Clair, Vice-President of the GAHS will facilitate the program with Bruce Heatwole and family joining in with their stories about Thelma. She started her journalistic career in 1946 as a reporter for *The Glendale Herald*. She had a 16 year career as a reporter for the *Arizona Republic* covering eight cities and Luke AFB. She wrote three books, *Ghost Towns*, *Arizona Hideaways* and *Arizona-Off the Beaten Path*. Thelma received over 100 awards in journalism and photography from the Arizona Press Women. She was an active member of GAHS and did

extensive research on the history of Sahuaro Ranch to place the site on the National Register of Historic Places. The meeting is held in the afternoon to allow those members that cannot drive at night to attend. This is another rare opportunity for members, guests and interested persons to learn more about

Glendale's history and those who made history. Refreshments will be served.

25TH ANNUAL ENGINE AND TRACTOR SHOW AT HISTORIC SAHUARO RANCH PARK

On February 14 and 15, 2015 the 25th Annual Engine and Tractor Show came to historic Sahuaro Park. It was an immensely successful event attracting over 6,000 attendees with nearly 200 antique engines and tractors. There were four large stationary engines. The Mayor and city council members were able to drive tractors from City Hall to the Sahuaro Ranch Barnyard to kick off the show. The first Engine and Tractor show event at Sahuaro Park was held in February 1991. It was held in a cleaned up and re-leveled barnyard accomplished by farming volunteers. The events brought attention to the historic Sahuaro Ranch and need for restoration of the buildings and yard space. Many old pieces of farm

equipment have been rescued from the junk pile and restored to appear in the engine and tractor shows. The show provided a fun and educational opportunity for the enthusiastic participants of all ages. It was amazing that many attendees were from Canada and many more from out of state. The Glendale Arizona Historical Society conducted tours of the Guest House and Adobe House experiencing over 400 visitors. The University of Arizona Venture had demonstration projects and hands on activities. This was the largest engine and tractor show to date. The members of the Arizona Early Day Gas Engine and Tractor Association as well as the City of Glendale staff are to be congratulated for their time in making this tractor show successful.

Charles and Dorothy Bailly were genial hosts for fine dining in the West Valley from 1964 to 1990. Dorothy was the former manager of both Durant's and the Stockyards restaurants. The Phoedalian Woman's Club was a driving force in the civic and social life of Glendale from 1961-2008. The forty women came from Glendale and West Phoenix. Their name was a combination of the two cities. Cathy Terrill has recollections of working with Pat Sweet to finish the Adobe House and portions of the Guest House. They even obtained a bed that has belonged to Dr. Phil Rice. The women were docents at festivals at Sahuaro Ranch Park and were attired in period clothing. Cathy remembers making and selling soap. These hard working women organized Neighborhood Block Parties were policemen and city officials would meet and get acquainted with the families. The money earned from the many different activities was given for scholarships. Some of the women still meet together informally. We appreciate the gift of their scrapbooks.

WASHBOARD



The Rosson House Museum in downtown Phoenix recently explained that in the 1880s, over 7 million washboards were manufactured and sold in the United States. There were over 20 varieties of washing boards. During the same period there were 2,458 patents granted for the washing machine. Washing machines could process 600 shirts per day, compared to 50 shirts per day on a washboard.
