

It's a new year and new opportunities for the Historical Society. The Board of Directors wishes you all a healthy and great 2019. The Board looks forward to preserving and protecting Glendale history. The maintenance of historic Manistee Ranch and buildings is the major on-going preservation project. The Board will spend nearly \$12,000 for necessary repairs for the house this year including replacement of four porch support piers and repair of two piers, gutter installation, woodpecker damage repair, stair

treads and wood trim, wood trim ledge, porch floor damage,

window and door screens repair and fixing crawl space screens to bar feral cats from access under the porch. Work will proceed with inventory of the Society documents and assets using a "Past Perfect" software and computer, oral histories will be completed. tours conducted at the Guest House, Adobe house and Manistee Ranch, changing of the exhibits, website, newsletters, program meetings, events and weddings to facilitate. The Board will continue to champion the preservation of historic resources such as Thunderbird Field #1 buildings and Glen Lakes Golf Course. It is considerable amount of work to accomplish these projects and is essential that volunteers help with these efforts. Also, donations for Manistee Ranch repairs are appreciated and have been the sole funding source to keep these landmark resources in good shape.

THUNDERBIRD SCHOOL **GLOBAL MANAGEMENT**



Arizona Christian University is "taking flight" and landing at historic former Thunderbird Field #1. University officials held an announcement meeting on November 14, 2018 at the Thunderbird School of Global Management Campus. Len Munsil, President of Arizona Christian University, indicated that the university will determine in a master plan whether any buildings need renovations.

Arizona Christian University traded for equal value their 20-acre campus located at Cactus Road and 24th Street for the 68 acres that contains the historic buildings at the Thunderbird of Global Management Campus. ACU has a current enrollment of 800 students. The Thunderbird campus will allow the university to expand and house 500 students on campus. The new site provides improved academic and sports facilities and more space for classrooms. Classes will start at the new location for the 2019-2020 academic year.

The Glendale Arizona Historical Society is reaching out to President Munsil and asking for a meeting to discuss the historical significance of the site and urge the university to preserve and protect the air control tower, Founders Hall and the hangar. Arizona State University would retain control of the vacant property and work toward possible residential development.

The GAHS Board of Directors is very pleased and relieved that Thunderbird Campus will be the new home of ACU. This will continue the historic use of the Thunderbird School of Global Management campus for higher education use.

Thank you, Arizona Christian University. The Glendale Arizona Historical Society welcomes you.

What to do with Historic Murphy Park?

Historic Murphy Park was created as part of the townsite by William J. Murphy in 1895 and later deeded to the town for public use. The park has been the center of public events for over 100 years. In the early 1900s businesses were expanding downtown.

Business leaders approached Mr. Murphy to allow the sale of a portion of the park for private businesses. Great pressure was exerted upon Mr. Murphy to reduce the park

and died soon after his decision.

In 1961 Maricopa County was looking for a location for their new \$318,000 county building. Glendale wanted the building in hopes of acquiring it through a longterm purchase plan. Mayor Byron Peck had proposed Murphy Park as the location as a means of preserving the park. It would take no more space than the library. The Mayor contended that the city-county building

size. He finally declared "No" would draw 5,000 people daily to downtown. Citizens stormed the city council chambers protesting the use of the city park for the building. The city council voted 4-3 not to use the city park.

Gladys and Joe Whitney

Two Who Served

Joe and Gladys Whitney are two people who moved to Glendale and

over decades provided needed services through business and their great effort devoted to serving the community through government and social activities. Joe Whitney was born August 11, 1900. He and his family moved to Glendale in 1911 and his Dad, Clarence, started a farm and dairy at the southwest corner of 67th and Northern Avenue at Grand. Joe graduated from Glendale high School in 1920. He worked for People's Lumber and Stauffer's Dry Good and then Union Oil Company.

Gladys Marie Holcomb was born in 1899 and moved to Arizona to attend Tempe Normal School graduating in 1925. Oran Teague convinced Joe to go out on a date with Gladys in 1925. Oran and Joe took Gladys on a picnic at the base of Hayden Butte. Gladys challenged Joe to climb the mountain with her. Joe ran after Gladys up the steep incline until she stumbled and stopped and then extended her arm for support. On their 57th wedding

anniversary, Joe said "It makes my feet hurt just to think about that day. I ruined my brand new shoes and had blisters on my feet for a week" Gladys taught at Lowell School until 1928 when she and Joe were married. Gladvs taught school in Tolleson until 1930 and then transferred to the Glendale School District. Gladys was active in the Glendale Woman's Club for 50 years, member of the Glendale Historical Society, active in the Glendale Little Theater, Horseless Carriage Club and President of the Glendale PEO. Gladys died in 1989 at age 90.

In 1935, Joe Whitney and Vic Brooks started the Rio Grande Oil Company service station at 58th Drive and Grand Avenue. They then bought the Western Auto Store next to the station. After WWII they opened Brooks and Whitney Auto Parts. The partnership stopped in 1960 when Joe retired. Joe was a founding member of the Glendale's Lion's Club and a member of the Horseless Carriage Club. He served in the early 1930's on the City Council and was the prime promoter to purchase the Seagraves fire truck in 1932. Joe died in 1987.
